



## IITC 2020 Year-end Update and Fundraising Appeal

Respectful greetings to our friends, supporters, and allies,

This has been a very challenging, and for far too many of us, a heartbreaking year. The COVID-19 pandemic has come into Indigenous Peoples' territories with a vengeance, highlighting long-standing disparities and vulnerabilities caused by lack of access to health care, erosion of our original food systems, and decades of resource exploitation.

As we mourn our losses, the pandemic has also been an urgent call to action for IITC. Our vital work to inform our Peoples and bring them together is more essential than ever.

Although our year is normally filled with in-person gatherings, in April we switched to a virtual format to bring Indigenous Peoples and our allies together for information-sharing and dialogue. IITC organized 20 webinars and online events with presentations by Indigenous elders, knowledge holders, youth and human rights experts, sharing strategies for resiliency, resistance, and healing. A new webinar series focusing on practical skills and traditional knowledge for eco- and food system protection, with topics like seed saving, fire prevention, water conservation, and soil restoration, will begin in January 2021.

Thanks to the generosity of concerned donors, IITC staff also distributed over 200,000 masks and gloves, hand sanitizers, and medical equipment to Indigenous Nations and communities in Minnesota, Arizona, California, and Sonora Mexico. Just last week we sent another 6000+ PPE items urgently needed to protect the health of the 8 Yaqui Pueblos in Sonora, Mexico.

A long-standing priority for IITC is the restoration and protection of our Food Sovereignty. In response to the double impacts of climate change and the pandemic, IITC has focused this year on building alliances to support family and community gardens, distribute food and meals with locally-grown sources, repatriate/rematriate original seeds, build youth engagement, and share information, knowledge, and methods. IITC also raised funds to support Indigenous Food Sovereignty COVID relief projects in the Yaqui, Tohono O'odham, Dine and Hopi Nations, and in Central and Northern Mexico. In 2021, additional projects are planned in Arizona, Oklahoma, Mexico, Panama, and Guatemala.



Since May 2020, IITC's COVID-19 relief program has received and distributed over 200,000 PPE including masks, gloves, hand sanitizers, and medical equipment as well as original seeds and home gardening supplies to Indigenous Tribal members in Arizona, New Mexico, Northern Mexico, Minnesota and California
